We Need Your Help to Protect Sawmill Brook

Working in partnership with Greenbelt, the Town of West Newbury has the opportunity to acquire 32 acres abutting the Pipestave Hill/Mill Pond Recreation Areas for \$705,000. Conserving this land will expand trails, protect important habitat and water supplies, and increase the town's resilience to the adverse impacts of climate change. At Town Meeting in April, West Newbury residents voted overwhelmingly to allocate up to \$350,000 in CPA funds to purchase the land. Thank you! Depending on the amount of state funding the project will receive, the Town's contribution of CPA funds may be reduced, and Greenbelt will fundraise \$100,000 to \$180,000 to close the gap and permanently protect this land.
