Don Cox grew up farming in Oklahoma. In 2009, at the age of 23, he boldly embraced an opportunity to farm on nearly 100 acres of land in Haverhill, MA, which had passed

down through his mother's family. He was met and encouraged by a resurgent local food movement in the Merrimack Valley that supported his early CSA vegetable operation. Through trial and error, and with the help of a job "off the farm", he and his wife Laura have worked hard to make Old Wild Farm productive using organic farming and sustainable forestry practices.

"The outside job provided needed capital to grow our operation and every year we've worked to improve its profitability," said Don. "It's also taken the pressure off to sap the land for short-term profit – we've turned down a developer's offer to purchase our land four times this winter."

While every family farm situation is unique in Essex County, Don and Laura's story is a familiar one. It is very difficult to start farming and make a living, and it's equally hard for established farmers to withstand the growing demand to develop the fertile, yet cleared, rolling landscape they have farmed for generations.

These are just two of the reasons that Greenbelt and five partner organizations are pleased to have been awarded \$1,050,000 through the Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) of the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service. The program will provide important seed funding to permanently protect working farms in the Merrimack River Valley over the next five years.

The awarded project, "Saving Farmland in the Southern Merrimack Watershed," allows Greenbelt to work with Essex County farmers to keep farming a vital part of the region's landscape and economy.

High land values in our region make these family farms extremely vulnerable to development. Greenbelt estimates that several thousand acres of unprotected farmland in the Merrimack Valley could change hands in the near future. The RCPP funding will allow Greenbelt to offer farmers the opportunity to keep their farms farming, forever.

According to project partner Land for Good, nearly 30% of Massachusetts farmers are likely to exit farming in the next decade, and 90% of these retiring farmers don't have a young farmer lined up to take over.

Although the main focus of the project will be voluntary agricultural conservation easement acquisition, Greenbelt and its partners will collaborate on a series of free workshops providing resources to both young farmers like Don and Laura, and older farmers thinking about their retirement. Over the 5-year project term, project partners Land for Good, Massachusetts Dept. of Agricultural Resources, National Young Farmers Coalition, Merrimack River Watershed Council, and the New Entry Sustainable Farming Project will collaborate on resource protection and educational programming on topics including farm business planning, how to find farmland to buy and lease, and farm succession planning.

"This program will be a real boost to farmland protection, viability, land access and farm legacy in this region,"

said Jim Hafner, Executive Director of Land for Good. "Viable farm businesses, access to land for next generation farmers, and securing the legacies of established farms and farmers are closely linked to permanent protection. Greenbelt is helping lead the way in applying farmland protection tools and building relationships to advance all these goals."

www.ecga.org @ecgreenbelt **Dear Friends** You'll often hear Greenbelt use the term **grassroots** to describe our approach to land conservation. In fact, we cannot be successful without it! The dictionary describes a grassroots movement as collective action from the local level that affects change at a higher level. For Greenbelt, it's about everyday citizens caring about something so much that they are willing to organize and inspire others to act on behalf of their community.

As we look back on the land conservation results Greenbelt achieved in 2017, and to what opportunities lie ahead for us this year, we see the examples of grassroots activism on behalf of land protection and nature everywhere.

Greenbelt began working with local community members in the Annisquam neighborhood of Gloucester, and in the southern region of Topsfield, who were galvanized by the possibility of large-scale development in their midst. With their help - by organizing their neighbors, attending meetings, raising funds and generating goodwill on Greenbelt's behalf - we were able to protect a scenic hillside on Lobster Cove in Gloucester and most of the historically significant Donibristle Farm in Topsfield. We highlight the efforts of grassroots activists for these projects in the 2017 Annual Report.

Grassroots movements may begin as small and at the hyper-local level, but they bring public attention to regional concerns. We saw this in action on Good Harbor Beach last summer, as our Land Stewardship crew helped protect exposed plover nests from danger. A passionate crew of citizens banded together to serve as plover wardens,

hoping to protect these tiny creatures until they could fledge.

Gandhi counseled, be the change we want to see in the world. Our recent Film & Lecture Series hoped to strike this chord, providing thought-provoking oppor-

tunities to learn, build community and change the world, one neighborhood at a time. While we admit our goal remains lofty and some of our challenges overwhelming, we believe individual action for the greater good will generate effects that resonate at the broadest possible level, shaping resilient futures and empowering communities.

Thank you for all you continue to do to support our conservation work at the grassroots level and for the personal commitment you are making to support nature and our fragile environment.


LAND ACQUISITION

Beverly Commons Gateway

5-ACRE ACCESS WITH PARKING TO BEVERLY COMMONS CONSERVATION AREA | BEVERLY

As part of a nearby development project, Greenbelt will acquire another five acres of land adjacent to our holdings in the Beverly Commons Conservation Area. The Commons (known to mountain bikers as "Greenwood") is an area of approximately 126 protected acres of land owned and managed by both Greenbelt and the City of Beverly. Long popular because of its challenging and extensive trail system, adequate access and parking has

always been limited. The addition of the Beverly Commons Gateway property allows Greenbelt to establish another access point along an existing driveway off of Webster Avenue. A beautiful "dragon's tooth" wall graces the edge of the driveway and curves up the slope to meet our existing trail system along the cliffs. We expect the project to be completed later this summer.



Last Hurdle for Mehaffey Farm: Clarifying Town Meeting Vote April 30

28.8 ACRES OF HISTORIC FARMLAND

ROWLEY

Greenbelt's recent award of an \$85,000 state grant for the Mehaffey Farm conservation restriction (CR) has closed the fundraising gap on our campaign. Now one hurdle remains. Rowley voters can help by voting "yes" on Article 25 at their April 30 Town Meeting to confirm - not change - the Town's authority to contribute \$100,000 of Community Preservation Act funds towards the CR acquisition. The vote does not change the amount authorized at the 2016 Town meeting. The Mehaffey Farm CR will permanently preserve this heritage farm from development, and allow for a new public trail and parking to access Willowdale State Forest.

PROGRAM UPDATE

Osprey Platforms Recovered, Restored, Reinstalled

Another Osprey nesting season has begun and Greenbelt's 2018 Osprey Program is well underway. The winter of 2018 was not kind to Osprey nest platforms in our region. At least 12 platforms were knocked down and swept away by the high tides and floating ice associated with a storm on January 4. Luckily, many of the platforms were found, recovered, restored and reinstalled in February and March in time for the Osprey's return.

Now with spring upon us, the Osprey are back in the area and nesting once again. Our crew of 20+ citizen scientist nest monitors are out there now collecting observational data and helping Greenbelt know what is happening and where. 



The Board is partnering with Koya Leadership Partners, a national search firm, in this critically important search and transition. Recruitment of candidates is ongoing. The search committee is excited with the search response to date, and will be conducting several rounds of interviews with promising candidates in April and early May. Engagement and interviews with finalist candidates will likely take place in late spring. We look forward to sharing further progress in the months ahead.
